What led you to pursue a career in speech-language pathology and aphasia in particular?

In 2010-2012, I served in the Peace Corps in Yambol, Bulgaria. There I witnessed many underrepresented communities, one of which was anyone with a communication difference or disability. People with aphasia, among other neurologically diverse popula-



tions, were commonly misdiagnosed. I became very interested in how I might help give a voice to these people. I began shadowing a speech pathologist. While I was learning more about how to treat speech and language disorders, I was also immersed in a world where Bulgarian became my primary language and English my home language. speaking city increased my interest in helping people who have difficulty communicating their ideas through spoken language.

Can you tell us a little about how you came to the ACC?

After the Peace Corps, I enrolled in the Speech & Hearing Sciences Graduate program at Portland State University. Portland State had a few different graduate level treatment programs, one of which was the Aphasia Group Therapy Clinic. I began looking into internships that used Aphasia Group therapy while also helping people with aphasia and their loved ones learn to support their communica-

tion. I applied for an internship at the ACC in 2015 and was fortunate to get the position!

Why is the ACC a unique place to work?

The ACC is a very unique place to work because as a therapist you have to take in "the whole picture" with respect to the clients, the community, and raising aphasia awareness. In addition to focusing on the progress that clients are making toward their goals and communication needs, I'm also constantly considering what each client's individual home environment might be like, who their family members are, and how effectively they are able to communicate their ideas and their identities to others.

Tell us a little about yourself, both personally and professionally?

I am 29 years old and I feel very

fortunate to be completing my Clinical Fellowship with the ACC, the required supervised professional experience of any Speech-Language Pathologist's career. I enjoy drawing and painting and love running the art class at the ACC each week. My husband and I enjoy playing strategy games (board, card, video etc.) and can often be found on weekends at local game shops strategizing in Bulgarian. I am also a long distance runner in my free time and a cycler during commute hours. Other hobbies include playing the guitar and flute. I also love visiting my parents in Daly City—we play music and run together!

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
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
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Great News! The Aphasia Center Accepts Vehicle Donations
